**Sensitive Info**

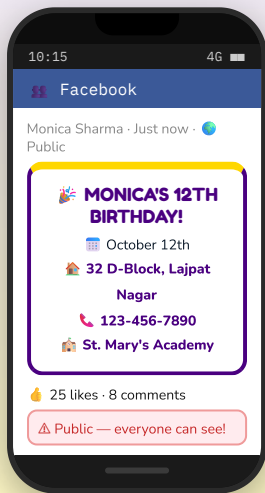
Details that can cause harm if shared. Password, phone number, Aadhaar.

When you share them publicly, **anyone in the world can see them** — not just your friends. 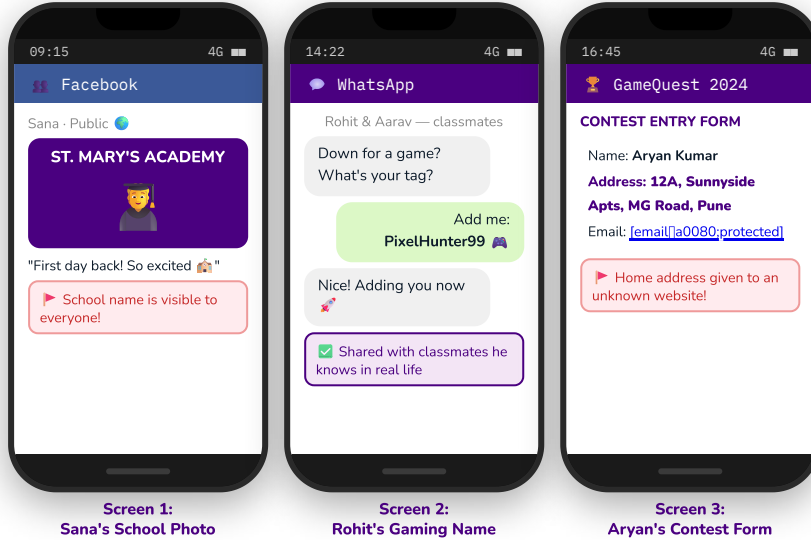

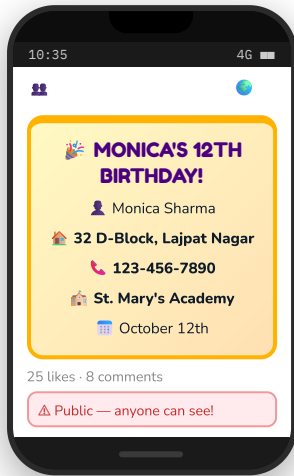

Scene 6 – Aryan finds a gaming contest asking for his Aadhaar number

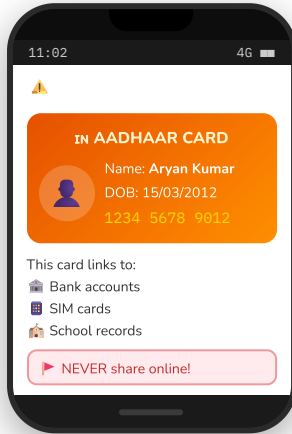
This contest says I can win ₹5000 if I give my Aadhaar number. It looks real! Should I just fill it in?

Get a SIM card

Your Aadhaar number links to your bank, your SIM card, and your identity. If someone gets it — they can pretend to be you. **Never share it online. Not for any prize. Not for any app. Not ever.**

Myth vs Fact – Do you believe any of these?

MYTH

"Only my name and address are private. School name is fine."

FACT: School name + uniform + location = a stranger can find you. **Details add up.**

MYTH

"I only have friends following me — my posts are safe."

FACT: If your account is **Public** — anyone in the world can see your posts.

MYTH

"I can delete a post if something goes wrong."

FACT: Once online, someone may have already **saved or shared** it. Deleting does not erase all copies.

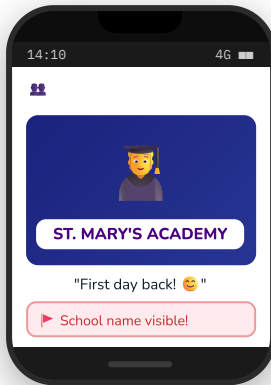


Photo A – NOT safe

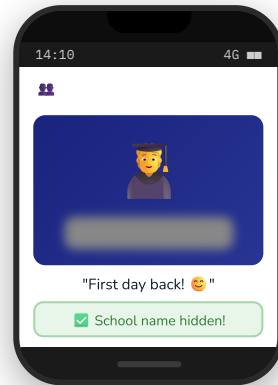


Photo B – Safe

Key Takeaways

Know What Is Personal Info
Name, address, phone, school, Aadhaar — all personal. Each detail adds up. Together they can be dangerous.

Public Means Everyone
If your post is Public — any stranger in the world can see it. Not just your friends. Always check your settings.

Never Share Aadhaar
Not for any contest, prize, or app. Your Aadhaar links to your bank and identity. Keep it completely private.

Think Before You Post
Ask: Can a stranger contact me? Find me? Pretend to be me? If YES to any — do not share that detail.

Monica, Rohit, Sana & Aryan's Golden Rule

"Before you post ANYTHING online — ask just three questions:

📞 Can someone contact me? 🔍 Can someone find me? 🗨️ Can someone pretend to be me?

If the answer to ANY of these is YES — remove that detail before you post. 🚫"
